Seven Feathers: Changing for the Better

It's not hard to see that things are changing on Exit 99. In recent years, the management and employees of the Seven Feathers Casino Resort have worked together to pursue a goal: to make the Seven Feathers Casino Resort the #1 tourist attraction in the state of Oregon. The extensive changes to the operations of the casino have already increased the amount of visitors by 20% as of April 2016.



The most obvious changes are to the structure and organization of the casino. Management has overseen the remodeling of several restaurants, the swimming pool, and the theme of the entire building.

Seven Feathers personnel, on both the managerial and staff levels have worked to incorporate a Tribal theme by bringing in culturally important symbols like Crater Lake, eagles, bears, elk, and more. These symbols are featured on prominent tables and surfaces in decoration theming. While subtle enough to be respectful, it allows staff to tell a story right when the guests ask about it.

“You could look at it and say ‘oh, that’s a nice chandelier and carpet,’” says Shawn McDaniel, General Manager of the casino, “but it also has cultural significance to it—something meaningful to the Tribe. We’ve already started doing that, and it’s been well received by the Tribal membership. It’s the feeling of ownership; a showcase for Tribal members. You can be proud of it, and say ‘that’s my casino.’ ”

It began with the Steelhead Lounge, but has since spread through the whole casino, such as the Elements Lounge, which incorporates the natural elements of fire, wind, and water into its design. Future plans detail cooperation with the Cultural Department to create Tribal display areas in some of the most-traveled areas of the casino.



Seven Feathers staff are able to manage the entirety of the casino through a state-of-the-art program called Four Winds. It completely controls every monitor or screen in the casino. This allows for instantaneous updates of advertisements, posters, jackpot notifications, directional signs, and much more. In fact, staff can even send a personalized birthday message directly to the monitor closest to a guest. Once the

(Continued from front page) casino installs monitors outside, they will be able to use them to point visitors toward open parking areas.

Perhaps the most exciting change is the introduction of Section 6. The casino owns the patent on a new video-mapping system that creates a realistic scene on the screens that cover every inch of the walls in a large room. Images are mapped to the room to create a 360 degree view of anything desired. Currently, the staff have digitized the Parthenon to fit a Roman theme, but **there is no limit to what they can map into the room. "We can make it look like Autzen Stadium during Ducks games, or make it look like the Super Bowl arena, and much more," says McDaniel. "The Tribe has a patent on this—we're the first ones to ever do something like this. We have casinos from all over the United States that are interested in this system, such as Tropicana, MGM, and Treasure Island."**



Unlike other jackpots, Section 6 will telegraph when a big payout is going to happen through light, sound, and visual effects on the screens. This gives anyone a chance to start playing on the machines in a chance to win the jackpot. This system is still in development, but it will be ready to delight casino guests when it is fully implemented sometime during the summer.


Not all the changes have targeted the guests of the casinos; in fact, many have benefitted the employees as well. Back halls that were once a stark hospital white are now being painted in encouraging colors, and decorated with positive sayings, employee recognition, and the mission statement and core values developed by the employees themselves. They also have a veterans wall, and an employee wall where new employees sign their names. Management has instituted an open-door policy, where any employee can come to any manager without an appointment to ask questions or share ideas.

Employees now also have a dedicated cafeteria, where they are served three times a day with meals selected from a **showcase of the top chefs' best dishes. Additionally, there is a drawing for employees each Friday, with prizes that range anywhere from hot tubs to DVD players and more. Managers and Supervisors submit an employee into this drawing each time they see them smiling, serving well, or otherwise following the core values or mission statements. In a recent survey of Seven Feathers employees, 80-90% said that they wouldn't want to work anywhere else.**

These changes are just the tip of the iceberg when it comes to the progress that the casino's staff and management have achieved. Their success so far is the result of countless hours of hard work and determination of those working in management and out on the floor, combined with the guidance and support of both the Tribal Board and the UIDC board.

Former Tribal Board Member Passes Away

Tom Rondeau, Sr., Former Tribal Board member, passed away on April 16, 2016 in Roseburg. Tom was a member of the Board of Directors for 30 years, and served the Tribe in many capacities. In addition to the Tribal Board, he was a founding board member of Umpqua Indian Development Corporation as well as the Cow Creek Umpqua Indian Foundation. Tom was involved in some of the earliest reorganization efforts of the Tribe in 1974, and held the first meeting at the Glide Community Center along with others that included Former Tribal Chairman Sue Shaffer and past board member Louella Rondeau **Michaels. Tom had a passion for the Tribe's history and culture, and although he didn't consider himself a storyteller, in a sense that is the role he fulfilled. He told many stories of the hunting and fishing techniques of his Tribal Elders, and carried on an oral history for the next generation of Tribal members. Tom, along with Buster Rondeau and Tooter Ansures, was very active in the Annual Cow Creek Pow-Wow, and was also a site monitor on archeological sites that involved the Bureau of Land Management and the Forest Service.**



Tom was a hard worker and had strong support for Tribal economic development and diversification for the Tribe and its members. He was an advocate for those in need, but had strongly believed that the Tribe should promote individual self-sufficiency, and that it should only play a supporting role for the success of Tribal members so as to encourage and help them to do what they could and should do for themselves. Tom retired from all board positions in 2012 and soon after moved into Callahan Court in Roseburg.

2016 General Council Nominations Meeting

Nominations for the Tribal Board of Directors were taken at the May 15, 2016 General Council Meeting, held at the Tribal Office in Roseburg. **6 Tribal members were nominated for two positions in this year's election. Michael Hamrick was nominated, but declined his nomination.** All other nominees were present and accepted their nomination. Nominations accepted for the 2016 Tribal Election will appear on the ballot as follows:

At the Tribal Board of Directors' request, the accounting firm of Wicks Emmett, LLP will have oversight of the Tribal Election Process. Ballot packets, including instructions, will be mailed out to registered voters of the Tribe from Wicks Emmett, LLP no later than Wednesday, July 13. If you are an eligible voter and do not receive a ballot, you must contact the Tribal Office at 1-800-929-8229 or 1-541-672-9405. Ballots are to be returned directly to the Cow Creek Elections Committee c/o Wicks Emmett, LLP at PMB # 6B, Roseburg, OR 97470 and must be received by the accounting firm no later than 4:00 PM on Friday, August 12.

The Annual Election Meeting will be held at 10:00 AM on Sunday, August 14 at the Cow Creek Tribal Government Offices, 2371 NE Stephens Street, Suite 100, Roseburg, OR 97470.



UIDC Business Distribution

At their March 30th meeting, the Tribal Board of Directors decided to approve a non-recurring tribal distribution of \$450 that will be sent out on June 17, 2016. The distribution will be to all Tribal members 18 years and older as of the disbursement date (June 17, 2016). For the last several years, Tribal businesses have been successful in various degrees in meeting all budgetary requirements, including planned capital improvements. For this reason, the board has determined that a one-time distribution of revenue that has accumulated over a period of years could be dispersed to the adult membership of the Tribe.

This UIDC Business distribution is unrelated to the Annual Tribal Distribution dispersed to all Tribal members (trust account for minors included) that is released in November of each year. Summer means that most families encounter increased childcare cost, as children are out of school. For that reason, the Tribal Board has approved this special distribution so that these funds can be used to help Tribal families meet extra expenses, or to use it to enroll in the Nesika health insurance program with enough funds to last until the November Annual Tribal Distribution.

The biggest difference lies in that **the Annual Tribal Distribution** is funded from proceeds of tribal gaming revenues and is governed under separate Tribal ordinances and federal law, while **the UIDC Business Distribution** is a collective of all non-gaming business revenue of the Tribe.

Each Tribal member must ensure that their address is current with the Tribal Government Office by May 31, 2016 in order to receive their distribution in a timely manner. **(Please submit updated addresses with the "ADDRESS CHANGE FORM" on page 9 of this newsletter.)**

This check will be combined with your annual distribution for tax purposes, and you will receive tax form 1099 in 2017.

Tribal Member Employee Spotlight

Travis Hill - Director of Hospitality



Born in Azalea, Oregon, and a graduate of Glendale High School, Tribal member Travis Hill began studying Marketing at the University of Washington, and later at UCC, aided all the while through funds from the Education Department when Vonnie McCafferty was Education Director. He gained experience working with casinos until he was hired as Hotel Director in 2003, and then rose through the ranks to become Director of the newly established Hospitality Division in 2007, with the Tribe helping provide opportunities for necessary certifications. He works with the UIDC on economic development and future projects, as well as inspecting Tribal businesses and planning events to make sure that the Tribe's customers are receiving the best care possible. "I work for the Tribe because I want to, and because I love what I do," he says.

Health Advisory Committee Member Vacancy

The Tribal Board of Directors has established a self-standing Health Advisory Committee to help the Tribal Board of Directors ensure that the Tribal Health Administration provides efficient and effective health care to Tribal members and other eligible persons. The Tribal Health Advisory Committee shall have eight members with a majority of the Committee being Cow Creek Tribal members at least 18 years of age. One vacancy on the committee needs to be filled:

Vacant Position: Tribal employee

The purpose of the Tribal Health Advisory Committee is as follows:

- To consider the application of scarce health care resources among competing health care priorities.
- To provide an advisory body to Tribal Board of Directors and Tribal Administration that is both responsive to the needs of the Tribal members and eligible clinic users representative of their interests with respect to the allocation of available resources.
- To promote the delivery of quality health care to Tribal members and eligible clinic users in a manner that accords **with Cow Creek's Tribes needs and values.**
- To represent the interests and desires of all Tribal members and eligible clinic users.

The Tribal Health Advisory Committee meets the first Monday of each quarter and receives both a mileage stipend and mileage reimbursement. To apply, please send a letter of interest with any supporting health related information to Sharon Stanphill, Health Director, by May 31, 2016.

Tribe to Participate in Earthquake Preparedness Exercise

Earthquakes are unique in that their impacts vary greatly based upon epicenter, strength, type, and specific geography in **respect to where the shaking occurs. The age and design of the "built environment" (buildings, infrastructure), as well as** advance planning by individuals and communities, also influence the impacts left by earthquakes. As a result, much of the information about earthquake preparedness is general and can be used for all types of hazard or disaster preparedness. What we know is that survival in a disaster begins with local, family, and individual steps, which eventually **include "whole community" readiness and government efforts.**

As you may know, there is a large earthquake exercise (Cascadia Rising 2016) occurring in June 2016 in the states of **Oregon, Washington, California and Idaho . The scenario assumes the "unzipping" of the Cascadia Subduction Zone fault** off the west coast. The scenario is catastrophic and alarming.

The Cow Creek Tribe will be participating in a targeted way and will include Housing, Human Services, Health and Wellness and Tribal Leadership as well as Douglas County. The outcomes and lessons learned from that exercise will be shared widely so that everyone can benefit.

Steelhead Salmon for the Food Bank

A big thanks to the Oregon Department of Fish and Wildlife (ODFW), the Umpqua Fishermen's Association (UFA), and Tribal volunteers! The Tribe partners with the ODFW and UFA on a winter steelhead acclimation program in the South Umpqua River. This partnership allows for a memorandum of understanding that outlines the process for the Tribe to receive donations of hatchery winter steelhead each spring to our Tribal Food Bank.

This is the third year we have received such donations. We received 54 total steelhead this year, which is a record-breaking number. We are very thankful to be able to offer traditional foods to our people. Many Tribal members volunteer each year to assist in collecting and processing the fish. Special Services and Programs for Tribal Members

General Assistance Program - This Bureau of Indian Affairs (BIA) program offers cash assistance to meet essential needs of food, clothing, shelter, and utilities. Each General Assistance recipient must work with a BIA social services worker to develop and sign an Individual Self-Sufficiency Plan to increase independence. Program requirements are as follows: Be an enrolled member of a Federally recognized AI/AN Tribe, not have sufficient resources to meet the essential needs as stated above, reside in an approved service area, not receiving any comparable public assistance, and apply concurrently for all other Federal, State, Tribal, County, and Local program for which that person may eligible. You are invited to learn more about how to receive financial assistance from the General Assistance Program!

BIA representative Jesse Hunt will be in the Government Office South Building Conference Room in Roseburg on May 24th, and June 21st to inform about the program, discuss eligibility, and help with the application process. Orientation begins at 9 AM, application assistance runs from 10 AM–12 PM and from 1–4 PM. Please be on time. If you plan to come, RSVP with Matt Droscher or Andrea Davis at 541-677-5575 and bring copies of the following: Tribal ID, Social Security, Driver's License or State ID cards, unemployment benefits letter (dated no sooner than May 1), TANF benefits letter (dated no sooner than May 1), food stamp or commodities benefits letter, per capita verification letter from your Tribe, verification of residence (or a signed letter verifying homelessness, couch surfing, temporary housing, etc.).

Free Douglas County Bus Passes! - The Bus Pass program is offering free monthly passes for Tribal adults, students, Elders, and disabled in Douglas County. These passes are refreshed every month, but there are a limited amount, so request yours today!

Reimbursing for a Safer Tomorrow - The Safety Program is offering reimbursement for car seats and bicycle helmets for each enrolled Tribal youth within the seven county service area.

Energy for Those In Need - The Tribe's Low Income Heating and Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) is offering energy assistance for those who need it. This is offered once a year for Tribal members in the seven-county service area who meet the qualifications on income and status. Resource and referral information can also be provided.



An Advocate for the Bruised and Battered - The Tribe has obtained a Crime Victims' Services

Division grant, and is using that money to partner with several co-located advocates from the Battered Persons Advocacy at the Government Offices, from the Women's Crisis Support Team in Grant's Pass, and from Community Works at the new Government Offices in Medford from 12–1 PM on Thursdays. An advocate is someone to whom you can speak privately and confidentially, and who can help you stay emotionally and physically safe. They can meet with and offer services for those affected by or interested in domestic violence, sexual assault, stalking, and human trafficking. Elders Walking Club


Wake up with determination to make a change! Go to bed with the satisfaction of knowing you're one step closer!
